FOREWORD

The political ephemera collection of the Institute of Commonwealth Studies was begun in the early 1960s and in thirty years has grown to some 10,000 items covering all countries of the Commonwealth of Nations.

Despite their value for research, few libraries engage in the acquisition of ephemeral materials: such publications are, for the most part, produced for specific events such as elections or meetings, in small editions, often in mimeographed or other non-printed format, and go out of print very guickly. Materials tend not to be subject to normal bibliographical controls; they are often excluded from, or fail to be recorded in, national bibliographies and are not sold through normal commercial channels. The librarian seeking to build a collection to record events and provide primary research materials faces considerable obstacles and finds that it is necessary to resort to non-conventional methods of acquisition.

For Africa, ephemera are particularly difficult to acquire. The years since independence have been politically stormy in many countries with many organizations formed, legal and illegal. Some have disappeared quickly while others have merged or formed alliances with other groups; others have achieved prominence as major political organizations and have formed governments. There is a need, therefore, to keep abreast of events in individual countries and to be aware of developments which are likely to lead to the publication of documents. Thus the formation of a new organization implies a constitution and a policy statement, while an announcement of a general election will lead to publication of a manifesto and various types of campaign literature. Many trade unions and pressure groups issue statements on government policy and matters of topical debate, and opposition parties are usually fruitful sources of published criticism. In order to identify actual or potential publications it is essential to monitor newspapers, current journals of political record and press reviews.

African ephemera are seldom acquired through normal trade channels though some local booksellers are willing to supply - at a price. The materials themselves cost little but the time and effort spent in tracking them down are costly and have to be recovered in high service charges. Most of the materials collected by the Institute of Commonwealth Studies have been acquired via direct approaches to individual organizations - a procedure which is not as straightforward as it might seem. Many organizations have no discernable addresses and locating those that exist can involve considerable effort. Replies are not necessarily forthcoming - possibly through inertia, indifference or suspicion. Many organizations make their publications available only to members - and membership is not usually available to foreign librarians! Often a great deal of effort is made with little or no result.

Ideally, ephemera should be subjected to legal deposit and listed in national bibliographies. However, very few African national bibliographies are sufficiently current to allow their use for library acquisition purposes and many will not have recorded the publications which are included in this microform project. It is fortunate, therefore, that Altair, by filming the Institute's collection, is making this imperfect but valuable collection available to a wider scholarly community.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The items in this collection have been filmed, country by country, in three main categories - Political Parties [PP], Trade Unions [TU] and Pressure Groups [PG]. Within each of these categories, the specific organizations have been filmed in alphabetical order.

All microfiches have eye-legible titles bearing (in addition to the main title of the publication) the name of the country in guestion; a prefix to denote the category to which the documents belong; a number to indicate the seguence (ie the shelf order) in which the material for each particular organization has been filmed; the full title of the organization concerned; the number of fiches involved for each organization; and the numbers of the specific items appearing on each fiche.

Within each specific country and organization, material has been filmed in library acquisition order. Each item is given a number as it enters the library and this number appears at the top right-hand corner of the cover first sheet of each document; it is also the number by which each individual document is identified in the 'Item' column in this printed GUIDE.

Example of fiche title: (see page 3 of the Guide)

On the first line: CPE stands for Commonwealth Political Ephemera. On the second line: PP2 indicates that Convention People's Party is

the second political party in the filming sequence and that the fourth of the nineteen fiches of Ghananian material contains a continuation of Item 17 to the first part of Item 19 of CPP items filmed.

The printed GUIDE lists all items filmed by country, by category - Political Party, Trade Union and Pressure Group - and in each main category, by specific organization. Under the heading of the organization concerned, each document is listed in library acquisition order by item number, title (and author where applicable), and date of publication. Pagination details are also given - eg 1-10 where there are ten numbered pages, or 10p where there are ten un-numbered pages. Documents written in both English and an African language are denoted by (Eng Afr Lang) which appears immediately before the pagination details. Typescript items are denoted by [ts] and manuscript items by [ms].

Inevitably, some of the documents filmed are of poor guality and may, in parts, be illegible. Where this is the case, the GUIDE has an * against the item number. A short note of explanation is often appended to the entries for these items.
